Summer Events Held in Historic Oahe Chapel

Originally part of the Oahe Mission established by Congregationalist missionaries, the Oahe Chapel is now owned by the South Dakota State Historical Society. It is managed by the Oahe Chapel Preservation Society, a notfor-profit group that oversees the maintenance and preservation of the Chapel. Although it is no longer used on a daily basis, various churches in the Pierre/Ft. Pierre area gather there for Sunday services at 8:00 a.m. from Memorial Day to Labor Day. This year, eight area churches hosted the services. The Chapel is also available for rent throughout the year for weddings, family reunions, and other special celebrations. Five couples were married in the Chapel during the summer of 2008. Those who participate in the events at the Chapel enjoy its unique history and scenic location. If you have never joined us for an event, mark your calendar for next summer's Sunday services, or call the South Dakota State Historical Society today to find out how to rent the Chapel. Artifacts Display History at Oahe Chapel

Before every Memorial Day, staff members of the South Dakota State Historical Society bring six artifacts from the Society's collection to the Chapel. These include a portrait of Oahe Mission founder Rev. Thomas L. Riggs,

Waterbury clock, the Oahe Congregational Church charter, and prints of Madonna Di San Sisto, Suffer Little Children, and Madonna with Christ Child. According to museum records, these items date to the 1880s. The artifacts remain in the Chapel until after Labor Day weekend. Three items remain at the Chapel throughout the year. These

are the pulpit, altar stand, and desk. The pulpit and altar stand date to around 1878, while records indicate the desk is from the 1920s. All nine of the artifacts were originally in the Oahe Chapel prior to its removal from Peoria Flats. These artifacts aid visitors in interpreting the unique history of the Chapel. ❖
