The Mountain-Plains Museum Association (MPMA) is holding its annual conference Sept. 13-17 in Rapid City. Please make plans now to attend.

The MPMA is a 10-state regional museum organization that includes all types and sizes of museums. It is affiliated with the American Association of Museums.

No one from South Dakota can remember the last time the MPMA met in our state, so this provides a rare, but excellent opportunity for South Dakotans to attend this conference. The South Dakota State Historical Society and the Association of South Dakota Museums are helping sponsor the conference.

Tours and workshops start off the conference. Approximately 50 sessions cover a wide variety of museum topics. Presenters and panelists share their expertise and advice on advocacy, budgets, collections, education, exhibits, fund raising and publicity. There is something for everybody.

South Dakota State Historical Society staff members, including State Archivist Chelle Somsen, Historic Preservation Director Jason Haug, and Museum Director Helen B Louise and



museum staff members Daniel Brosz, Kate Higdon and Ronette Rumpca, will be participating on panels during the conference.

Keynote speakers include American Association of Museums President Ford Bell, former South Dakota Senator George S. McGovern, Paleontologist Kirk R. Johnson, former Mount Rushmore Superintendent Gerard Baker, and Ruth Ziolkowskil of Crazy Horse Memorial.

The opening reception takes place at Mount Rushmore National Memorial. One evening we have a "museum crawl" that takes us to three different Rapid City museums. The closing party takes on a Sturgis Motorcycle Rally theme. So bring your biker attire and have fun. You will not want to miss attending the MPMA Conference this fall in Rapid City! jdv
