### **Historic Kimball newspaper titles now available online**

PIERRE, S.D. – Two Kimball newspapers have been added to the growing online database of historical United States newspapers, according to the South Dakota State Historical Society.

In 2014 the State Historical Society-Archives at the Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre received a two-year \$294,655 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to digitize historical newspapers. The project is part of Chronicling America, a Library of Congress initiative to develop an online database of select historical newspapers from around the United States. As part of the grant the State Historical Society-Archives will digitize around 100 rolls of microfilmed newspapers pre-dating 1922 to be included in this collection.

The Kimball Enterprise (1883) and the Kimball Graphic (1883-1905) are now both available on Chronicling America.

“These titles join others that are already available, including the Canton Advocate, Dakota Farmer’s Advocate, Dakota Farmers’ Leader, Lincoln County Advocate, Canton Daily Leader, The Daily Press and Dakotian, Yankton Daily Press and Dakotian, the Press and Daily Dakotian, Forest City Press, Hot Springs Star, Hot Springs Weekly Star, and Turner County Herald,” said Chelle Somsen, state archivist.
