Window Workshop at the Chapel a Success!!!

Fall 2010

Again this year Governor Mike Rounds proclaimed May as South Dakota Archaeology & Historic Preservation This year's theme, The People's House: Celebrating the Century, commemorated the 100th anniversary of the State Capitol. South Dakota State Historical Society events associated with Archaeology & Historic Preservation Month this year included production of the annual poster, a program on the project to restore the Capitol presented by John Moison, a Pierre/Ft. Pierre Then and Now PowerPoint presentation, three bus tours of historic Pierre sites led by staff members Chris Nelson and Ken Stewart, and a three-day hands-on historic window workshop at the Oahe Chapel taught by Bob Yapp.

Bob Yapp is a nationally known preservation expert. From May 14-16th Yapp instructed 15 South Dakotans in techniques to repair and preserve wood windows. Two students worked on each window removing old paint and putty, repairing deteriorated sashes with wood epoxy, reinstalling glazing, and repainting the windows. They added rubber gaskets and metal weather stripping, increasing energy efficiency, before reinstalling the windows. Workshop participants learned that repairing, rather than replacing, historic windows preserves historic character and is ultimately more cost effective. After returning home, a couple of the contractors who attended the workshop let Yapp know that they would never throw away a historic window again. �

The Oahe Chapel continues to be a treasured location for the community, and promises to be so for years to come with the support from interested folks such as you. �

Chapel Advertised in Capital Journal's *Capitol Centennial*Publication

2010 marked the centennial of the completion of South Dakota's Statehouse. The grand structure began in 1907 and opened its doors for use in 1910. Festivities for this milestone were held on June 19 featuring a number of programs, including a rededication of the Capitol by Gov. M. Michael Rounds and other dignitaries. In commemoration of this event, the Capital Journal published a special booklet titled "Capitol Centennial." The booklet highlighted the history of the building, complete with historic and contemporary photographs. The booklet also contained a number of advertisements from local businesses and organizations, including the Oahe Chapel. Our quarter-page, full color advertisement ran on page 43 and invited people to consider our rustic little prairie chapel as the location for their special event.
