Parade participants, rodeo contestants, teamsters with wagons, stock contractors, American Indians, Deadwood re-enactors, clowns, bullfighters, rodeo queens, bands, rodeo spectators, local families and anybody else were invited to join the Days committee for the photo. The panoramic photos were part of the annual celebration from 1928 through teh 1950s. This year's was the first commissioned since 1993.

The Fall River County Historical Society in Hot Springs recently received two grants. A \$10,000 grant from the Mary Chilton DAR Foundation will be used to expand the new archive space in the lower level of the Pioneer Museum. And a \$20,000 grant from the Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission will be for repairing the masonry and foundation on the Pioneer Museum.

encouraged to participate in the Exhibit Hall.

The featured speaker lineup brings together national leaders:

- \* Sen. McGovern, who is now a nominee for a Nobel Peace Prize, will offer a lifetime of achievement and historical perspective to this year's attendees.
- \* Paleontology will frame the message from keynote speaker Dr. Kirk Johnson, chief curator at the Denver Museum of Nature and Science. His specialty recently netted him a place on the "Dream Team" of paleontologists from around the world who clarified the reason for the extinction of dinosaurs.
- \* Gerard Baker, recently retired Mount Rushmore superintendent, will talk about current studies and issues involving the memorial.
  - \* Dr. Ford Bell, president of the

American Association of Museums, will provide perspectives on national and international museum issues.

\* I will discuss the state of museums in South Dakota.

Local experts will lead tours of museums and historic sites in Rapid City and the Black Hills. The opening reception will be held at night at Mount Rushmore, and another evening will be spent visiting The Journey Museum and the Dahl Art Center in Rapid City and the South Dakota Air and Space Museum at Ellsworth Air Force Base.

Nine workshops will be held, covering topics such as "How to Clean Artifacts Properly," "Research Techniques for Museums," "Interpretive Writing," and "Making Mannequins." Other topics include exhibits, collections insurance, volunteers and teachers.

Many people have put lots of time and effort into planning the conference. Host committee co-chairs are Mary Kopco of Deadwood, director of the Adams Museum and House; and Ray Summers of Rapid City, director of The Journey. Program committee co-chairs are Sue Gates of Aberdeen, director of the Dacotah Prairie Museum; and Chris Orwoll of Hutchinson, Kan., president and CEO of the Kansas Cosmosphere and Space Center.

Major sponsors of the conference include the Black Hills Corporation and the City of Deadwood. Other sponsors are the South Dakota Humanities Council, the Cheisman Center, Henderson Phillips Insurance Company, Split Rock Studios, the South Dakota State Historical Society, the Association of South Dakota Museums, and many of the state historical societies in MPMA's 10-state region.
