

Bureau of Indian Affairs

The Bureau of Indian Affairs, commonly called the Office of Indian Affairs until 1947, was created within the War Department in 1824 where it operated until 1849. In 1849 the Office of Indian Affairs was transferred to the Department of Interior, where it remains today. General correspondence and records of the BIA are filed under Record Group 75 and include reports, vital statistics, tribal census rolls, probate records, annuity and allotment records, accounting records, individual case files, and school records.

Supervision of Indian affairs was achieved through two types of field jurisdiction – superintendencies and agencies. Responsibility for Indian affairs in geographic areas fell to superintendents whose main duty was to supervise relations among Indian peoples and to supervise conduct of Indian agents.

Initially agents were viewed as diplomatic representatives of the United States, preserving and restoring peace among Indian peoples and non-Indians, while inducing Indian nations to cede their lands to the federal government. During the reservation era, their roles shifted toward the education and “civilization” of Indian peoples. The Bureau of Indian Affairs continues to operate offices at all the South Dakota agencies.

Register of Letters Received by the Office of Indian Affairs, 1861-1880 (M18).

The records in this microfilm publication consists of registers of letters received by the Office of Indian Affairs from 1861 to 1880. Register entries include the name of the writer; the date the letter was written; the date it was received; the place where it was written; a summary of its contents; the jurisdiction or other heading under which the letter was filed; and the file number assigned to each letter upon its receipt.

Each volume is divided into alphabetical sections; the letters “I” and “J” were combined for registering and filing purposes. The registers contain some cross-references to enclosures and to letters registered under a name different from the expected one.

The entire collection of 126 rolls is available from the National Archives and Records Administration. The original letters are available in microfilm publication M234, Letters Received by the Office of Indian Affairs (see below).

Register of Letters Received by the Office of Indian Affairs, 1881-1907 (P2186).

This microfilm publication consists of registers for letters received by the Office of Indian Affairs from 1881 to 1907 from Office employees, government officials, and private sources concerning Indians and the business and activities of the Office. Register entries include the name and address of the writer; date the letter was received; date the letter was written; an indication of its subject matter; its file number; the division of the Office to which the letter was referred for handling; and references to related records. Sometimes a note is included about the actions taken.

Letters were registered in these volumes chronologically in order of receipt. File numbers were assigned, beginning with each year, in the order in which the letters were registered. Beginning in June 1905, letters from the Secretary of the Interior were registered in separate volumes and only the file numbers to these letters were entered in the main series of registers. These separate registers comprise the last three rolls of the publication. Many letters were registered that were not filed with the series of incoming letters. Some were referred to the Secretary of the Interior, the Second Auditor, or some other official outside the Office. An indication of such a referral was usually made in the register. When a letter was withdrawn from the main series of incoming correspondence and filed with some other series of records of the Office, a notation sometimes was made in the register and a cross-reference placed with the correspondence. Since the registers are arranged chronologically, alphabetical indexes were compiled to help locate letters relating to particular subjects. These indexes are available in microfilm publication P2187.

Roll 1 of this publication begins with Volume 127 of the registers, picking up where publication M18 ended.

Letters Received by the Office of Indian Affairs, 1824-1880 (M234).

The records in this microfilm publication consist of communications received by the Office of Indian Affairs from the agencies concerning the general situation of the Indians, their population, education, health, and medical care, and their agriculture and subsistence. The letters cover such matters of administrative concern as emigration, land allotments, annuity payments, depredations, claims, complaints, traders, buildings, supplies, employees, and accounts. Correspondence is grouped by agency, then by year, and thereunder arranged alphabetically by initial letter of surname or official position of the writer. Within each alphabetical section, correspondence is arranged by file number, which was assigned to each letter as they were registered (see publication M18).

The rolls listed below contain records from agencies outside South Dakota that have relevance for our regional history. The rolls containing records from South Dakota agencies are listed in that agency's section of the guide. The entire collection of 962 rolls is available from the National Archives and Records Administration.

Letters Sent by the Office of Indian Affairs, 1860-1881 (M21).

This microfilm publication consists of handwritten copies of the general outgoing correspondence of the Office of Indian Affairs. Included are instructions to superintendents, agents, and other employees and acknowledgements of and replies to incoming correspondence. Reports to the Secretary of the Interior and to certain other officials, including chairmen of congressional committees, were copied in a separate series of volumes called "Report Books," published as M348, Report Books of the Office of Indian Affairs.

Until 1869 the letters were copied in chronological order. Beginning in that year, two or more books were used simultaneously. Letters relating to certain broad subjects (such as land, finance, and civilization) were copied into separate books, but within each book the arrangement continued to be chronological. Most of the volumes are indexed by name of addressee and, to some extent, by subject. There are also marginal notations of the page numbers for other letters to the same person.

The entire collection of 166 rolls is available from the National Archives and Records Administration.

Report Books of the Office of Indian Affairs, 1860-1885 (M348).

This microfilm publication consists of report books containing handwritten copies of letters sent by the Office of Indian Affairs to members of the President's cabinet having supervisory responsibility for Indian Affairs. The report books also contain some copies of letters to the President, Members of Congress, and other government officials. The use of the report books to record letters to officials other than the supervising Secretary was gradually discontinued, and by 1870 the report books only contained letters to the Secretary of the Interior.

All communications to the Secretary were considered “reports.” They range from extensive narratives, such as annual reports, to brief letters transmitting documents or recommending appointments. They relate to almost every aspect of the administration of Indian affairs, including the negotiation and enforcement of treaties; estimates and appropriations; legislation; investigations; claims (particularly for depredations); maintenance of order and military operations; liquor control; establishment of reservations, trust funds, and schools; the field organization of the Indian service; location of agencies; appointments; and employees, buildings, supplies, and accounts.

The letters were transcribed in chronological order, with some exceptions. Frequently, at the end of a volume there are some letters that were omitted from their proper date order in the book. Report Book 33 (reproduced on NARA roll 33) contains many letters erroneously omitted from other volumes.

The entire collection of 53 rolls is available from the National Archives and Records Administration. These letters are not duplicated in the “Letters Sent” series (M21).

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Special Files of the Office of Indian Affairs, 1807-1904, bulk: 1940-1904 (M574).

This microfilm publication contains the Special Files of the Office of Indian Affairs. The Special Files consist of correspondence, reports, accounts, affidavits, and other records that were brought together for easy reference. The records relate principally to claims and investigations but include some other subjects. The claims were those of traders for goods furnished to Indians or to the government, transportation contractors for shipping services, attorneys for legal fees, other

persons for services to Indians or to the government, both Indians and whites for losses from depredations, Indians for losses resulting from their removal from the East, and persons claiming the right to share in tribal benefits. Many of the claims were submitted in conformance with provisions of treaties between Indian tribes and the United States. The investigations, other than those of claims, relate principally to the conduct of employees of the office.

Most of the records in this series were withdrawn from the general incoming correspondence of the office; but some records of special commissions, transmitted to the office when their work was completed, are also included. Most of the files relate to a single subject. The inclusive dates of the series are those of the records in the files, usually the date of receipt in the office or by a commission. The actual dates of individual documents, especially those submitted as evidence for claims, may be much earlier.

These particular rolls were selected and purchased by State Archives staff for their relevance to South Dakota history. The entire collection of 85 rolls is available from the National Archives and Records Administration. The following list is taken from inserts provided by the National Archives.

Indian Census Rolls, 1885-1940 (M595).

Because Indians on reservations were not citizens until 1924, nineteenth and early twentieth century census takers did not count Indians for congressional representation. Instead, the U.S. government took special censuses in connection with Indian treaties, the last of which was in 1871. The result of many treaties was to extinguish Indian ties to land. Typically, the Indians agreed to reduce their landholdings or to move to an area less desired for white settlement. Some treaties provided for the dissolution of the tribes and the allotment of land to individual Indians. The censuses determined who was eligible for the allotments.

These census rolls were usually submitted each year by agents or superintendents in charge of Indian reservations, as required by an act of July 4, 1884. The data on the rolls vary to some extent, but usually given are the English and/or Indian name of the person, roll number, age or date of birth, sex, and relationship to head of family. Beginning in 1930, the rolls also show the degree of Indian blood, marital status, ward status, place of residence, and sometimes other information. For certain years – including 1935, 1936, 1938, and 1939 – only supplemental rolls of additions and deletions were compiled. Most of the 1940 rolls have been retained by the Bureau of Indian affairs and are not included in this publication.

There is not a census for every reservation or group of Indians for every year. Only persons who maintained a formal affiliation with a tribe under Federal supervision are listed on these census rolls.

The census rolls listed below are from agencies outside South Dakota that have relevance for our regional history. The Indian census rolls for South Dakota agencies are listed in that agency's section of the guide.

Reports of Inspection of the Field Jurisdictions of the Office of Indian Affairs, 1873-1900 (M1070).

Beginning in 1873, inspectors were required to make annual visits to each agency and report on the conditions of the Indians and the extent to which they adopted white culture, reservation boundaries, the use of reservation lands, the state of industry (usually farming and cattle grazing), the character and abilities of the agent and other employees, school conditions, the status of agency fiscal records, and enforcement or violation of the law. These reports are an

excellent resource for information about agency employees and Indian day schools, as well as the administration of the agency. The following rolls were purchased by State Archives' staff for their relevance to South Dakota.
