## **Records Relating to the Investigation of the Fort Philip Kearney (or Fetterman) Massacre, 1866-1867 (M740).**

This microfilm publication from the National Archives contains reproduced records initially transmitted to the Bureau of Indian Affairs by a special commission appointed to investigate the causes of and the events relating to the Fort Philip Kearney (or Fetterman) Massacre of December 21, 1866. The committee was appointed by President Andrew Johnson on February 18, 1867 to investigate the circumstances of the massacre and to determine the necessary steps to avoid a full-scale war with the Sioux Indians. Records include transcripts of testimony taken from officers and civilians present at Fort Phil Kearney at the time of the incident; council proceedings with Indian leaders and minutes; reports; and letters received by the commissioners.
