## HB 1047 gives Historical Society needed funds for renovation

We were very pleased that Gov. Kristi Noem included in her budget request a major renovation to the Cultural Heritage Center. The bill with the \$8.8 million in General Funds and \$3.3 million in other funds unanimously passed the House Education Committee, the Joint Appropriations Committee, and both chambers of the state legislature. With the signing into law of House Bill 1047, the State Engineer and the Department of Education will soon be taking bids to do the work.

That work consists of three main efforts. First, as the building was first constructed in 1989, there are several issues that need updating with the heating and cooling, the electrical, and other issues regarding more than 30 years of

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#### **Field Reports**

On Friday, June 17, at the Capitol Rotunda in Pierre, the public is invited to celebrate the Trail of Governors completion with the 10 a.m. unveiling of the last three statues of South Dakota's former Governors. They will honor Governors Andrew E. Lee of Vermillion, Frank M. Byrne of Faulkton and W.J. Bulow of Beresford. The only project if its kind in the country, the trail of life-sized bronzes of all 31 former Governors adorn the Capitol grounds and wind their way thru Pierre's business district to the Missouri River. Created by noted South Dakota artists, the Trail tells the visitor about our state's history and culture and the life and times of our great leaders. 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Dwight Vaught is the new director of the National Music Museum in Vermillion, as of Dec. 27. 2021. Vaught is a doctoral candidate in Public Administration at the University of Illinois-Springfield. Since 2018, he served as house manager for the performing arts at UIS. He has worked with four universities and several independent non-profit organizations, specializing in arts and humanities programming, outreach programming, fundraising and facility management. The NMM is preparing to reopen the historic wing of its facility, with 12,000 square feet of new exhibitions, in 2023.

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The Grant County Historical Society, based in Milbank, is in the process of selling the historic Congregational Church in Milbank, The purchaser is "Next Town Ministries" of Watertown. The purchase price is the same amount the society paid for the church in October of 2012 — \$1. Members of the GCHS board of directors are in favor of returning this historic church to active service as a place of worship, as it had been from its dedication in 1884 until 2012, a period of 128 years.

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wear and tear. Secondly, our ability to continue to collect artifacts and archival documents is nearing an end due to diminishing space. Some of this funding will go towards installing a mezzanine within the existing high ceilings of the archival and museum storage spaces so that we can continue to collect and preserve South Dakota's history. We will also take the opportunity to modernize the staff's workspaces and improve and modernize the public research room and other public spaces. Lastly, we will enhance our museum exhibits to be more accessible for today's audiences and make sure South Dakota's stories are understood by all who visit. The South Dakota Historical Society Foundation will be key to supporting the museum's aspirations, and we appreciate their continued partnership on this major effort.

As the contractor has not yet been hired, the timeline of when this work will begin is not yet set. I expect the work to begin in late summer and that the center will be undergoing the renovation in phases for the next two years. More to come on this issue and we'll spread the word to keep you informed.

These are exciting times for South Dakota's history. We have a once-in-a-lifetime chance to not only improve our building for its public use, and staff, but also to make sure the museum explains our history to our future visitors.
