## COME TO DAKOTA!

Free land drew thousands to Dakota

Railroads built lines into sparsely populated territory hoping immigrants and profits would follow. Government officials and town boosters encouraged settlers with promises of the good life. Communities, railroads, and the government all advertised aggressively. Reality seldom got in the way of a good promotional line. This exhibit looks at the marketing used to draw settlers to Dakota.

No one played nice in the fierce competition for settlers. Iowa newspapers referred to the "barren, desolate, Godforsaken land of Dakota." Dakota boosters shot back, "You men from Michigan and Illinois, from Iowa and other states . . . where one-half of the year you are alternately freezing and thawing and wading in mud up to your ears . . . come to God's country."

Early officials sang Dakota's praises

Early governors touted Dakota's assets. Printed copies of their speaches made compelling promotional material. The territorial Immigration Bureau was established in 1871. The bureau printed and distributed promotional pamphlets written in English, German, and Scandinavian languages.




The Golden Letter When geologist Ferdinand V. Hayden visited the Black Hills in 1866, the governor asked him to write a description of the area. Hayden's response became known as the Golden Letter because it claimed the Hills had gold, silver, and gypsum. Printed by newspapers nationwide, the Golden Letter gave faraway readers a favorable impression of Dakota.

In 1875, the Immigration Bureau sent out over 18,000 promotional pamphlets.

Land agents traveled throughout Canada and Europe urging prospective immigrants to settle in Dakota. Local agents selected land, prepared homestead paperwork and paid filing fees for newly arrived settlers.





## DAKOTA RAILS

Railroads had a profound effect on Dakota settlement Railroads laid down track before people moved into an area. They advertised heavily to entice immigrants. Their overseas immigration offices spread the word about Dakota in Great Britain, Norway, Denmark, Sweden, Holland, Switzerland, and Germany.



Railroads platted over 400 towns in Dakota. With a town every 7 to 10 miles along the track, farmers with a team and wagon could get to town and return home in the same day.



Town boosters worked relentlessly to attract settlers Newspaper editors used their papers to promote their towns. Many towns dreamed of being the "next Chicago" and marketed themselves accordingly. Weekly promotional columns ran in many papers. Immigrants were among the area's best promoters. Personal letters to family and friends back east and overseas encouraged them to come to Dakota. Ethnic groups often settled one area together.


Events draw big crowds

At the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago, South Dakota boosters highlighted the state. Displays included over 100 varieties of wheat, oats and other grains and a 14-foot cornstalk arch. The wool industry displayed a stuffed sheep. At the local level, town boosters used fairs and expositions to entice settlers with visions of abundant crops and robust livestock.









Over 180,000 people 20,000 from South Dakota signed the massive guest register at the South Dakota pavilion of the Columbian Exposition. The register was billed as "the world's largest book."


