Summer Events Held in Historic Oahe Chapel

Originally part of the Oahe Mission established by Congregationalist missionaries, the Oahe Chapel is now owned by the South Dakota State Historical Society. It is managed by the Oahe Chapel Preservation Society (OCPS), a not-for-profit group that oversees the maintenance and preservation of the Chapel. Although it is no longer used on a daily basis, various churches in the Pierre/Ft. Pierre area gather there for Sunday services at 8:00 a.m. from Memorial Day weekend to Labor Day weekend. The Chapel is also available for rent year round. This year, eight area churches hosted Sunday services, and two couples were married in the Chapel. In addition, Tour de Kota riders stopped at the Chapel in June as they pedaled across the state. Those who participate in the events at the Chapel enjoy its unique history and scenic location. If you have never joined us for an event, mark your calendar for next summer's Sunday services, or call the South Dakota State Historical Society today to find out how to rent the Chapel. Oahe Chapel to Host Window Restoration Workshop

The Oahe Chapel Preservation Society (OCPS) is excited to announce that author, teacher, and nationally-known old house expert Bob Yapp will host a window restoration workshop at the Chapel in May 2010. The workshop will be held over a three-day period and will offer intensive, hands-on training for workshop participants. The intent of the workshop is to teach students how to repair historic wood windows while restoring the windows that are currently in the Chapel. Kate Nelson, Vice President of OCPS, said: "We are thrilled to have an expert like Mr. Yapp come to Pierre to teach this workshop, because it means we can save the old wood windows in the Chapel. They are an important historic feature, and we are excited to learn how to take proper care of them. We are also grateful to the South Dakota State Historical Society for providing funding for this important workshop."
