## OAHE CHAPEL CELEBRATES 140<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY


The 140th anniversary of the Oahe Chapel was celebrated on September 24. The celebration included an ecumenical worship service led by Reverend Emily Munger of Pierre's First Congregational United Church of Christ, music by Jack Horner, and a luncheon held in the Oahe Dam Visitor Center next to the chapel. Freewill donations collected during the event totaled \$704 and are earmarked for the continued maintenance of this historic building.

The Oahe Mission was established in 1872 by Rev. Thomas Riggs and his younger brother Henry to serve the Sioux Indians of central South Dakota. Thomas and his first wife, Nina, operated the mission. A small log house was the center of activities. When the home became too small, money was raised for the construction of the chapel. Funding started with 14 cents sent by Nina's six-year-old nephew. Other donations came from Nina's home church in Bangor, Maine, the American Board of Foreign Missions and the Dakota tribes. The cost for the new chapel came to \$1,400, and the first service was held there in September of 1877. Rev. Riggs stayed active in this church until his death in 1940, and his second wife, Louisa, continued to teach Sunday school classes there until her death in 1951.

Fast forward to 2017: we were thrilled to have three former students of Rev. and Mrs. Riggs in attendance at the 140th anniversary celebration. Mrs. Josephine Robinson Venner, Mrs. Helen Robinson Tuveson, and Mr. Harvey Robinson were baptized at the Oahe Chapel as children by Rev. Riggs and had Louisa as a Sunday school teacher. It was an honor to meet them and a joy to hear their stories about this special place.
